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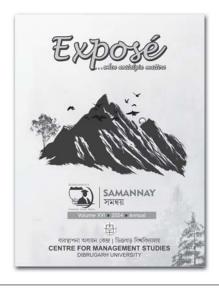

Being the Head of the Institution, I anticipate your continued success in creating more memories together in the years to come!

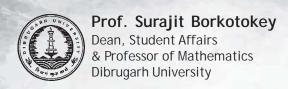

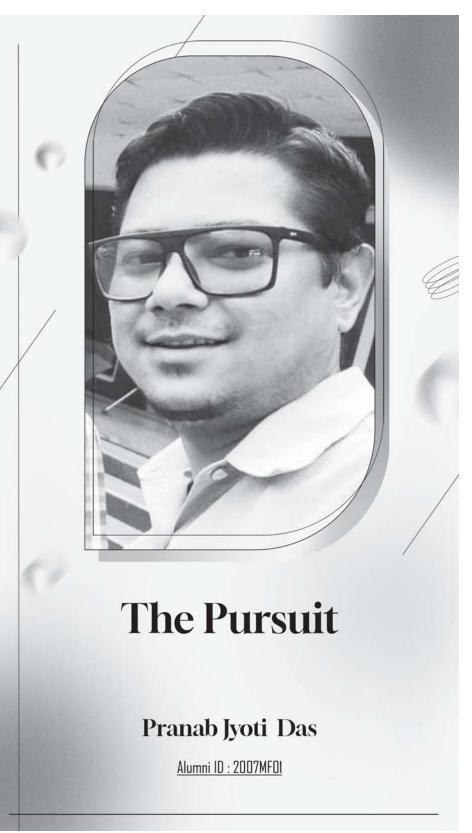

t is believed that human evolution traces back to several millions of years, beginning with early hominins who evolved in the African region. Over time, species like 'Homo habilis' and 'Homo erectus' developed, leading to 'Homo sapiens' thousands of years ago. Early humans were hunter-gatherers, but the advent of agriculture marked a turning point, leading to settled communities and the rise of civilizations. This shift enabled the development of complex societal structures like cities, social hierarchies and institutions, often centered around agriculture, trade, and religion leading to advancements in technology, writing, governance and culture, laying the foundation for the modern world.

It is fascinating to note that compared to earlier centuries, most of the significant innovations and discoveries have occurred from the 17<sup>th</sup> century onward, particularly during the following periods:

- 1. 17<sup>th</sup> Century (1600s): The Scientific Revolution brought about major advancements in physics, astronomy, and biology, with figures like Galileo, Newton, and Descartes.
- 2. 18<sup>th</sup> Century (1700s): The Enlightenment era fostered developments in science, philosophy, and politics, leading to the Industrial Revolution's early stages.
- 3. 19<sup>th</sup> Century (1800s): The Industrial Revolution accelerated, with major technological innovations in transportation (steam engines, railroads), communication (telegraph), and medicine (vaccination).
- 4. 20th Century (1900s): A period of unprecedented innovation in





various fields, including the development of electricity, the automobile, the airplane, and computers. The atomic age, space exploration, and advancements in biology and medicine also defined this century.

5. 21st Century (2000s): The digital age continues with rapid advancements in information technology, biotechnology, artificial intelligence, and renewable energy.



Meanwhile, when we try looking into the journey of mankind so far; along the way there have been various ups & downs and many civilizations emerged, evolved, flourished, vanished and some got adapted and transformed. The earliest known civilizations, such as Mesopotamia, Egypt, the Indus Valley, and China, arose around 3000 BCE. These civilizations flourished by mastering agriculture, creating writing systems, and establishing trade networks etc.

As civilizations evolved, they expanded through conquests, trade, and cultural exchanges. This led to the rise of great empires like the Roman, Persian, Han, Maurya, Chola, Vijayanagara Empires and the Ahom kingdom, to name a few. These societies achieved remarkable advancements in governance, law, art & culture, and science. However, civilizations often faced challenges such as resource depletion, environmental changes, internal conflicts, and invasions. These factors contributed to the decline and eventual vanishing of many civilizations.

For the purpose of reference, we may imagine a giant triangle in the context of the evolutionary

journey. One arm of the triangle may be called as CIVILIZATIONS that over time rose from the remnants of old ones, building on previous knowledge and innovations, leading to the continuous cycle of rise, flourish, and decline in human history. The second arm of the triangle may be called GOVERNANCE, where there have been different structures of governance that emerged, evolved, declined and changed with time and circumstances such as Monarchies, Oligarchies and Aristocracies, Democracies, Authoritarianism and Totalitarianism, Theocratic Governance, etc. The third arm of the triangle may be called ECONOMIC SYSTEMS such as Traditional & Tribal Systems, Capitalist, Socialist, Communist, Social Democracies, Mixed Economy, etc.

When we fast forward to the 21st century and the current time period, prima-facie the most common economic system across nations seems to be the Mixed Economic system; however, a careful observation shows that there's a growing ingredient of capitalism and hyper consumerism across most of the countries. Such Hyper-consumerism leads to excessive and compulsive buying of goods, driven by the desire for material possessions rather than actual need. As individuals and societies prioritize consumption over sustainability and deeper wellbeing, it often leads to environmental degradation, social inequality, and personal debt. Aggressive brands with persistent marketing practices fuel hyper-consumerism thereby often pushing people to develop ignorant deeper attachments to various goods & services, compromising on meaningful selfidentity and eventually creating even more thirst for consumerism.

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Consumerism has become a hypnosis that keeps our culture immature, as it keeps us overly focused on ourselves and on material desires, instead of on cultivating deeper soul richness.

### 8. Be Al aware:

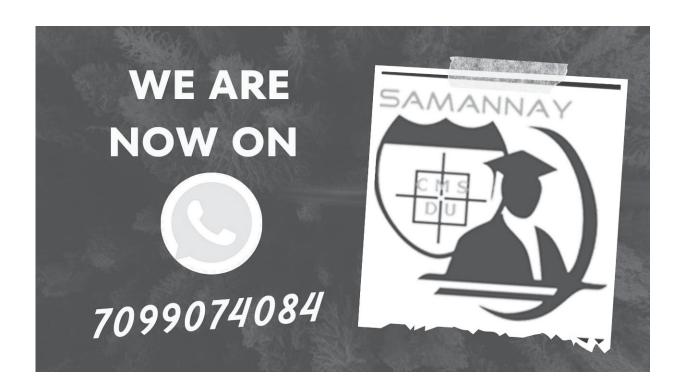

The campus, a stage, where we acted out, Our roles, with passion, without a doubt, CMS, a place, where hearts were made strong, And knowledge grew, all day long.

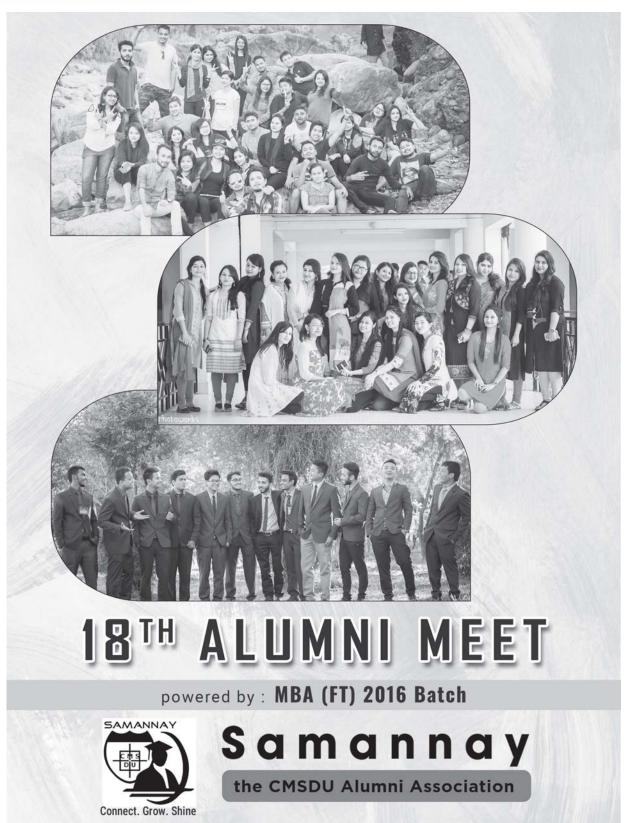
Though years go by, and we go apart, CMS memories, forever in our heart, A treasure box, of love and light, Guiding us on, through life's dark night.
